The meeting opened with the salute to the flag and the Pledge of Allegiance led by the Tuckahoe Police Explorers.

PRESENTATIONS:

The Police Explorers awards were presented by Andrew Zirolnik.Chief Costanzo, the Mayor and the Board congratulated the explorers.

Sandy Reyes-Guerra gave a presentation on behalf of the Environmental and Tree Committees on the NYSDEC Climate change pledge. Trustee Giordano questioned its necessity and inquired whether the language could be modified. Sandy felt that although it is not necessary to, she believes it could; by the Village Board making a pledge to this commitment would make the Village more favorable when applying for grant money and said there is no down side. Mayor Ecklond wanted to know if they have to adopt a specific language. Trustee Giordano didn't understand why it is necessary to formalize it and is concerned that it has strings attached noting the disclaimer at the end of it. He said that words have meaning, agreements have meaning. Ms. Reyes-Guerra said it's more of a reward to municipalities that are moving forward. Trustee Giordano suggested a further look be taken at the language. Ms. Reyes-Guerra also discussed honor walks and gateway seasonal planting.

MaryAnn Jonaitis spoke in favor of the pledge.

Trustee Quigley made a motion to open public hearing; motion was seconded by Trustee Giordano and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

A LOCAL LAW AMENDING AND ADDING ARTICLE V OF CHAPTER 15, ENTITLED "MISCELLANEOUS OFFENSES AND PROVISIONS," SECTIONS 15-55 THROUGH 15-59 OF THE VILLAGE CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF TUCKAHOE, ENTITLED "REUSABLE SHOPPING BAG INITIATIVE" PREVIOUSLY REFERRED TO AS "RETAIL CARRYOUT BAGS"

At a regular meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Tuckahoe, New York (the "Village") held at Village Hall, 65 Main Street, Tuckahoe, New York on February 4, 2013.

WHEREAS, legislation has been requested amending and adding Article V of Chapter 15, entitled, "Miscellaneous Offenses and Provisions," Sections 15-55 through 15-59 of the Village Code of the Village of Tuckahoe, entitled "Reusable Shopping Bag Initiative;" and

WHEREAS, according to the Clean Air Council, Americans use approximately 1 billion plastic non-biodegradable plastic shopping bags per year; and

WHEREAS, according to the United States Environmental Protection Agency, only 12% of plastic bags and plastic wraps in the U.S. were recycled in 2010; and

WHEREAS, non-biodegradable plastic bags last hundreds of years in landfills and are a potential source of harmful chemicals when they do break down; and

WHEREAS, non-biodegradable plastic bags often are discarded into the environment polluting our waterways, clogging sewers, endangering marine life and causing unsightly litter; and

WHEREAS, a resolution was duly adopted by the Village Board of the Village of Tuckahoe, New York for a public hearing to held by the Village Board on the 11th day of March 2013 at 8:00 p.m. at Village Hall, 65 Main Street, Tuckahoe, New York, to hear all interested parties concerning certain amendments and additions to the Village Code of the Village of Tuckahoe pertaining to Retail Carryout Bags; and

WHEREAS, notice of said public hearing was duly advertised in the Journal News, one of the official newspapers of said Village, on the 7th day of February 2013, and on the 19th day of March 2013; and

WHEREAS, said public hearing was duly held on the 11th day of March 2013, 8th day of April 2013 and 13th day of May 2013 at 8:00 p.m. at Village Hall, 65 Main Street, Tuckahoe, New York, and all parties in attendance were permitted an opportunity to speak on behalf of or in opposition to certain amendments and additions to the Village Code of the Village of Tuckahoe pertaining to Retail Carryout Bags; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 6 NYCRR Part 617 of the implementing regulations pertaining to Article 8 of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) it has been determined by the Village Board of said Village that adoption of said proposed Local Law would not have a significant effect upon the environment; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board, after due deliberation, finds it in the best interest of said Village to adopt said Local Law.

Be it enacted by the Village Board of Trustees of the Village of Tuckahoe as follows:

Section 1. Article V of Chapter 15, entitled "Miscellaneous Offenses and

Provisions", Sections 15-55 through 15-59, entitled "Reusable Shopping Bag Initiative"

of the Village Code of the Village of Tuckahoe is hereby amended and added as

follows:

Article V. ____ Retail Carryout Bags

§ 15-55. **Purpose.**

The intent of this Local Law is to improve the environment and quality of life in the Village of Tuckahoe by encouraging the use of reusable carryout bags and banning the use of plastic bags for retail carryout of purchased goods. Retail establishments are encouraged to make reusable bags available for sale.

§ 15-56. **Definitions.**

The following words and terms, when used in this Local Law, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section:

Carryout Bag – A bag that is provided to a customer at the point of sale for the purpose of carrying away goods or other materials from the point of sale. This term does not include Plastic Produce Bags, Plastic Garment Bags, or plastic bags measuring 28" by 36" or larger in size.

Customer – Any person purchasing goods from a Retail Store or other retail seller.

Operator – Any Person in control of or having responsibility for the operation of a Retail Store, who may include, but is not limited to, the owner of the Retail Store.

Person – Any natural person, firm, corporation, company, partnership, business, organization or group however organized.

Plastic Garment Bag – A flexible container made of very thin plastic material with a single opening that is used to transport clothing from a dry cleaner.

Plastic Produce Bag – Any bag with a single opening without handles and other packaging made of very thin plastic material that is used exclusively to carry produce, meats, fish or other food items to the point of sale in a Retail Store or to prevent such food items from coming into direct contact with other purchased items.

Post-Consumer Recycled Material – Material that would otherwise be destined for solid waste disposal, having completed its intended end use and product life cycle. Such material does not include materials and by-products generated from, and commonly reused within, an original manufacturing and fabrication process.

Recyclable – Material that can be sorted, cleansed, and reconstituted using available recycling collection programs.

Recyclable Paper Bag – a paper bag that has the following characteristics: (1) contains no old growth fiber; (2) is 100% recyclable overall and contains a minimum of 40% post-consumer recycled content; (3) is capable of composting consistent with the timeline and specifications of the American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM) Standard D6400; (4) is accepted for recycling in curbside programs in the Village of Tuckahoe, Town of Eastchester, and Westchester County; (5) has printed on the bag the name of the manufacturer, the country where the bag was manufactured, and the percentage of postconsumer recycled material used; and (6) displays the word "Recyclable" in a highly visible manner on the outside of the bag.

Retail Sale – The transfer to a customer of goods in exchange for payment occurring in a Retail Store. The term Retail Sale does not include sales of goods at yard sales, tag sales and other sales by residents at their home, and sales by not-for-profit organizations.

Retail Store – Shall include, but not be limited to, retail stores, sidewalk sales venues, farmers' markets, flea markets, restaurants, and other retail food outlets.

Reusable Bag – A bag with handles that is specifically designed and manufactured for multiple reuse and is (1) made of cloth or other fabric; and/or (2) durable plastic that is at least 2.25 mils thick; and (3) washable or is made from a material that can be cleaned or disinfected.

§ 15-57. **Restriction on Carryout Bags.**

- A. Any person engaged in Retail Sales shall provide only Reusable Bags and/or Recyclable Paper Bags as Carryout Bags to customers.
- B. Nothing in this section shall preclude persons engaged in Retail Sales from making Reusable Bags or Recyclable Paper Bags available for sale to customers.
- C. Nothing in this section shall prohibit customers from using bags of any type that they bring to the Retail Store themselves or from carrying away goods that are not placed in a bag, in lieu of using bags provided by the store.
- D. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the uses of Plastic Garment Bags or Plastic Produce Bags in the manners specified in this Local Law.

§ 15-58. Effective date.

This Local Law shall become effective six (6) months following its filing in the Office of the Secretary of State to allow retail establishments to dispose of their existing inventory of plastic bags and convert to alternative packaging materials.

§ 15-59. **Penalties for offenses.**

- A. The Code Enforcement Officer has primary responsibility for enforcement of this Local Law and is authorized to promulgate regulations and to take any and all other actions reasonable and necessary to enforce this Local Law, including, but not limited to investigating alleged violations, issuing fines and entering the premises of any Retail Store during business hours.
- B. In the event that there is a violation of this Local Law, the Code Enforcement Officer will issue a written notice of the violation to the Operator of the Retail Store in which the violation has occurred and the potential penalties that will apply for future violations. The notice shall be served by personal delivery or by certified mail.
- C. There shall be no penalty for the first violation. Penalties for subsequent violations shall be imposed as follows:
 - 1. For the second violation, a fine not exceeding \$100.
 - 2. For the third violation, a fine not exceeding \$250.
 - 3. For the fourth and any subsequent violations, a fine not exceeding \$500.
- D. Each occurrence of a violation, and each day that such violation continues following receipt of the notice of violation, shall constitute a separate violation and shall be subject to the penalties set forth in Paragraph C of this Section.
- E. All fines collected pursuant to this Local Law shall be used for an environmental purpose as determined in the sole discretion of the Village Board of Trustees.
- F. Any Operator of a Retail Store who receives a notice of violation or fine may request an administrative review of the accuracy of the determination or the propriety of the violation or any fine by filing a written notice of appeal with the Village Clerk no later than 30 days after receipt of the notice or fine. The notice of appeal must include all facts supporting the appeal and any statements and other evidence, including copies of all written documentation and a

list of any witnesses that the appellant wishes to be considered in connection with the appeal. The appeal shall be heard by a hearing officer designated by the Village Clerk. The hearing officer will conduct a hearing concerning the appeal within 45 days from the date that the notice of appeal is filed, or on a later date if agreed upon by the appellant and the Village, and will give the appellant 10 days prior written notice of the date of the hearing. The hearing officer may sustain, rescind, or modify the violation or fine by written decision. The hearing officer will have the power to waive any portion of the fine in a manner consistent with the decision. The decision of the hearing officer is final and effective on the date of service of the written decision, is not subject to further administrative review, and constitutes the final administrative decision.

<u>Section 2.</u> Nothing in this Local Law is intended to create any requirement, power or duty that is in conflict with any federal, state, county or town law or regulation.

<u>Section 3.</u> If any section of this Local Law shall be held unconstitutional, invalid, or ineffective, in whole or in part, such determination shall not be deemed to affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this Local Law.

<u>Section 4.</u> Insofar as the provisions of this Local Law are inconsistent with the provisions of any other local law, the provisions of this Local Law shall be controlling.

<u>Section 5.</u> This Local Law will take effect six (6) months following filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

<u>Section 6</u>. The Village Clerk be and she hereby is directed to enter this Local Law in the minutes of this meeting and give due notice of the adoption of said Local Law to the Secretary of the State of New York.

Trustee Quigley made a motion to open public hearing; motion was seconded by Trustee Giordano and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

Mayor Ecklond read the following e-mail. AGAINST !!!!!

For these reasons:

There are still plastic garbage bags made of the same plastic all over that won't go away so putting a ban on these small needed bags MAKES NO SENSE.

Needed for these reasons: the elderly carrying their groceries, mothers with babies carrying their groceries, handicap carrying their groceries large orders with heavy items inc sodas people riding bicycles and motorcycles trying to carry groceries

Brown paper bags are made much lighter today and do not hold any weight.

AGAINST !!!!

Nicky's Corner Deli

Mark from Epsteins asked about a time frame and said they have just purchased \$8000.00 worth of plastic bags that would last a year. He would comply but requests a phase in period. He added that paper bags are much more expensive and creates a hardship. Recycle bags are moderately successful but not overwhelming successful.

MaryAnn Jonaitis spoke in favor of the shopping bag initiative.

Trustee Quigley gave an overview of the below statement urging all board members to vote in favor of the initiative.

TUCKAHOE'S REUSABLE SHOPPING BAG INITIATIVE

Factors to Consider

Merchants/Businesses

In two widely publicized public hearings, only one business owner testified against the law (Deborah Scannel from Café 72). Significantly, in her second comment that evening, she asked whether there would be sufficient time and education for the public and business owners to ensure compliance.

Steve Wincele, manager of Epstein's who was interviewed for the Journal News article on March 2, 2013, and whose store arguably uses more plastic shopping bags than any other business in Tuckahoe, has not voiced an objection.

There has not been any comment from the Eastchester/Tuckahoe Chamber of Commerce which has been repeatedly informed by Camille. I was at the Chamber meeting on May 6 and introduced myself to the group as a Village Trustee. Again, no comments.

Stop and Shop, whose parent company is opposing the law in the Town of Mamaroneck, has a sign outside the entrance to its Eastchester store stating that one reusable bag saves 335 plastic bags. My personal experience as a regular Stop and Shop shopper is that fewer than 25% of the shoppers bring reusable bags.

Southampton, NY, which has a Waldbaum's supermarket, enacted the law. According to Roger Blaugh, Co-chair of the Southampton Advocates for the Village Environment and Mayor's Environmental Advisory Committee in Southampton, "The Chairman of A&P [parent company] wrote a nice letter to the Southampton Press stating that they back our reusable bag program and were 'onboard' and were proud to contribute to the effort."

Also, according to Mr. Blaugh: "McDonald's corporate office called us to say that this law is in numerous places in the US already and they were ready to comply."

Jonathan Cunitz, a legislator in Westport Connecticut, where the law was enacted in 2008, reports no fines and only one letter to a merchant that was not in compliance.

Education/Encouragement Is Not Enough

When Mayor Bloomberg proposed banning smoking in bars and restaurants ten years ago, the industry claimed that it would severely harm business; when the law *reinstating* the requirement for deposits on soda and beer cans and bottles was being considered, the beverage industry claimed it would be unworkable and unduly burdensome.

Voluntary compliance with good ideas generally requires some force of law; e.g., seat belts were in cars long before the seat belt laws were enacted which increased their use and decreased traffic fatalities.

According to Roger Blaugh in Southampton: "Shoppers began bringing their own bags to the stores well in advance of the six month effective date. The Town of Southampton underwent a year-long effort to educate the public to bring reusable bags to the store and recycle their old plastic bags at designated dropoff areas ... failure. Unless there is a law, it will not get done. Since we [Village of Southampton] enacted the law, you cannot find a plastic bag in a tree, drain, bush, parking lot, park, beach, lake or bay anywhere in our village... p-bag litter is gone forever and so, seemingly is a lot of other litter. We don't know the connection, but it is evident."

Sara Goddard of Rye made the following points at the hearing:

- Rye (population 15,000) has no supermarkets, but does have a CVS store
- The law is a part of a broader campaign to educate the public to reduce its use of items that can be harmful to the environment.
- There have not been any negative repercussions

<u>E Coli Study and Health Considerations</u>

The study Vito Catagna mentioned is deeply flawed:

- It was funded in part by the American Chemistry Council.
- It was not peer reviewed.
- According to the allgiv.com web site: "Skeptics of the study have noted the small statistical sampling taken over a limited time period in a single jurisdiction known for some uncommon demographics."
- There are no reported E Coli or salmonella cases from reusable bags in any of the local municipalities that have enacted the law.

It is easy to wash the reusable bags along with the regular laundry.

Plastic bags on the ground can hold standing water which can be a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

Westchester

Westchester communities that have enacted the law: Rye (unanimous: 5 Republicans, 1 Democrat, 1 independent), Larchmont (unanimous) and Mamaroneck (unanimous).

- Rye's statute has been in effect since May 2012.

- Former Rye Deputy Mayor Suzanna Keith (Rep.), a sponsor of the law, sent a letter to the Mayor and Board in support. A copy of this letter is attached.

- An article in the WMOA e-newsletter, quoted Larchmont's Mayor: "A compelling

case was made for the ban of some plastic bags. The point is, we're not just banning specific bags. This is a reusable bag initiative that will help in some small way to reduce the amount of plastics in landfills."

- Monica Barach from Mamaroneck's Committee on the Environment advised that the law was supported by the Chamber of Commerce.

Comments at the Public Hearings

Sara Goddard of Rye made the following points at the hearing:

- Lifestyle changes for the residents have been "minimal"
- Plastic shopping bags came into regular use only in 1975.

Clare Gorman testified that the Environmental Committee will work with the merchants and public to ensure smooth implementation of the law.

MaryAnn Jonaitis testified regarding:

- opportunity for merchants to put their names on reusable bags
- students are growing up with the idea of reusable products including water bottles and bags this is a generation that is embracing "reducing, reusing and recycling".

Practical Aspects

Enforcement can be done through the Code Enforcement Officer.

Plastic shopping bags will not be banned in Tuckahoe – the merchants will not be allowed to give them out when purchases are made.

Merchants will have the option to sell or give away paper bags and reusable bags,

Conclusion

We are justifiably proud of Tuckahoe as a progressive community and all agree that the initiatives by Frank DiMarco, the DPW and our Environmental and Tree Committees have put Tuckahoe at the forefront in Westchester with respect to sustainability and environmental matters. Encouraging the use of reusable shopping bags by banning the distribution of plastic shopping bags is completely in line with these objectives. Plastic, non-biodegradable shopping bags are fast becoming an anachronism and Tuckahoe should join Rye, Mamaroneck and Larchmont at the forefront.

Mayor Ecklond was discouraged that very few businesses gave any input. There isn't an outcry from businesses against. He asked the attorney if they could change the language. John Cavallaro said there is a ripening period if the language changes. He suggested the penalty to be reduced to maybe a dollar. A business will either adhere or not adhere to the initiative. It lets businesses know that we are trying to work with them.

Trustee Giordano thanked Trustee Quigley for a great deal of time spent. His principles are all easy for us to get around. The problem is the punitive aspect to it. He is concerned with a mixed value message. It should be an encouragement and we could put those businesses that comply on our website. He wants it revised to do away with the punitive aspect and has trouble putting a ban on it and issuing fines. Mayor Ecklond asked if he would agree with the dollar penalty. Trustee Giordano does not like the dollar penalty and would like to reward the businesses showing initiative by putting them on our website.

Trustee Luisi read the following statement: Roughly 50 billion plastic water bottles end up in U.S. landfills each year — 140 million every day! That's enough, laid end to end, to reach China and back each day.

In 2008, Americans drank an average 215 bottles of water each for a total of 66 billion bottles. Of that total, only 22% was recycled. (Back 2Tap). The previous statistics have not even taken in consideration the plastic bottles used for detergent, food products and medicine

More than 240 million tires are thrown away each year in the United States. Fewer than 7 percent are recycled, 11 percent are burned for fuel, and 5 percent are exported. The remaining 78 percent are sent to landfills, stockpiled, or illegally dumped.

It has been estimated that 500 billion to one trillion bags are made across the world each year. The U.S. goes through 100 billion plastic shopping bags annually along with 12 million barrels of oil are used each year to make these bags.

Tuckahoe is proposing banning the use of plastic bags in retails stores. It sure seems like a good idea. The before mentioned statistics are staggering. But I also considered....what effect will this ban have on everyday life in the Village of Tuckahoe? What effect will it have on business owners as they conduct their daily operations? What is the intent of this proposed ordinance? Will it dramatically enhance the quality of life here in Tuckahoe? Recently I walked up Main Street. It was a regular week day, approximately 11:00 clock in the morning. The traffic was backed up from Columbus Ave past Fairview Ave simply due to the volume of cars. Cars, trucks and buses sitting there idling with their engines running. I witnessed a similar situation on Lake Ave, with vehicles waiting for the green light on Main Street. This amount of traffic affecting air quality in an area this size seems to be a far more pressing concern from an environmental standpoint and much more obvious quality of life issue. But forgive me for moving off the topic.

I've read the about the many municipalities not only here in the United States, but around the world that have banned plastic bags. I've read about paper bags being better for the environment, and the more eco-friendly reusable bags becoming harbors of harmful bacteria if they are not washed.

But in the end, all this talk about plastics and carbon foot prints are just a byproduct of our 21st century society. It's not going away not matter how many bans are enacted. Seriously, what kind of initiative are we giving to the consumer by offering them \$.05 rebate for using a non disposable bag? The city of Seattle, Washington passed a plastic bag law in January of 2012. To date not one business has been fined. Why? Because of limited enforcement staff.

In 2008 Westchester County passed a law mandating all retail establishments over 10,000 square feet providing plastic bags to its customers as a result of a sale must also provide a recycling bin for plastics.

My family's food shopping is done at ShopRite, which is where I bring all my recyclable plastic. Since 1992, they have implemented a bag reuse program, which in the last six years has kept 260 million bags out of our landfills. In 2012, 3,193 tons of plastic was recycled at their own facility in Elizabeth, New Jersey.

Since we are never going to ban all plastic bags and containers, I strongly favor a program to encourage and further develop robust recycling programs. Plastic is not the problem, people that litter is the problem.

There are simple steps we can take as consumers to reduce the amount of plastic bags that are wasted every day:

- 1. Just say "no thank you" when cashiers offer you a plastic bag for your groceries or other goods
- 2. Bring your own reusable bag with you when going to the grocery store (or any store)
- 3. Reuse or recycle any plastic bags you may get.

I am in favor of allowing the residents of Tuckahoe to make their own decisions when it comes to the use of plastic bags and not burdening the business establishments with more government mandates.

Trustee Hayes said that over the past 5 years the Village has made great strides to greener and more sustainable. Our business community is small. We do not have a supermarket or big box store. Owners continue to say that struggle to keep afloat. We all put our trash out Monday and Friday in big black garbage bags. The penalty section is the most concerning and the enforcement. Are they really going to get the fine? It's not the police it's code enforcement. Trustee Hayes does not understand why the Chamber has not spoken on behalf of the businesses and is not sure if legislating is the way to go. Trustee Quigley is willing to table this. He is surprised regarding these comments. We are the 4th municipality to pass this. He does not want this to be High School Civics project. Maybe we can work out this over the next month.

Trustee Quigley made a motion to keep open public hearing; motion was seconded by Trustee Hayes and upon roll call was carried by a vote 4-1. Trustee Luisi opposed.

AN ACT in relation to authorizing the public service commission, upon application by a municipality, to order costs for infrastructure main tenance and access to be charged to all customer classes located in such municipality THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEM BLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. 1. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, a municipality may apply to the public service commission to have any costs for infras tructure maintenance and access it is charged by a water-works corpo ration to instead be charged to all customers across all customer class es located in the municipality provided the municipality has held a public hearing on the matter and has adopted a resolution and determined by a majority vote of the total voting strength of its governing body that it is in the overall public interest to have such costs charged to all customers across all customer classes. Any savings achieved as a result of this action shall be applied to the property tax levy of the municipality which has adopted such a resolution in an amount equal to such savings in the following fiscal year. Within 120 days after receiving an application pursuant to this act, the public service commission is empowered and directed to issue an order requiring that costs for infrastructure maintenance and access be included in the rates charged to all customer classes and apportioned among all customers located in the municipality and that such municipality shall not be charged separately or additionally for costs for infrastructure mainte nance and access. The public service commission shall have the power to request any information that it may deem necessary from the water-works corporation or municipality so that it may issue an order as required by this section and may require that such information or application be in the form and manner as the commission may request.

EXPLANATION--Matter in ITALICS (underscored) is new; matter in brackets [] is old law to be omitted. LBD05066-02-3 A. 4086 2 2. Definitions. For purposes of this act: a. "costs for infrastructure maintenance and access" means all costs associated with maintenance and operation of infrastructure and equip ment used in connection with the sale, furnishing, transmission and distribution of water for domestic, commercial, public and emergency purposes and shall also mean costs or charges associated with municipal access to infrastructure or equipment. b. "municipality" shall mean a city, town or village located in the county of Westchester. c. "water-works corporation" shall have the same meaning as that term is defined in section 2 of the public service law.

S 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
