The meeting opened with the salute to the flag and Pledge of Allegiance.

V. PUBLIC HEARINGS

PUBLIC HEARING I.

CONTINUATION OF PUBLIC HEARING ON A PROPOSED LOCAL LAW TO REZONE THE MARBLEDALE ROAD INDUSTRIAL CORRIDOR TO A GENERAL BUSINESS OR COMMERCIAL ZONING DISTRICT IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE VILLAGE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN, ADOPTED MAY 2008.

Trustee Ecklond motioned to continue public hearing was seconded by Trustee Coleman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 4-0.

The Mayor referenced to a letter from Westchester County Planning Board. He discussed incentives, number of tiers, environmental standards, water runoff and containment, strategies and bonuses, recycling and pollution, environmentally friendly building, and whether there will be senior housing, building that will not impact the school district, and the need to entice businesses to come into the Village.

Ricky Gargiulo of Archer Drive, Eastchester said that he agreed with the construction of a green building and the incentives; however, he encouraged the board to move forward with this proposal to help with the tax base

Trustee Ecklond motioned to continue public hearing was seconded by Trustee Coleman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

PUBLIC HEARING II.

PUBLIC HEARING ON A PROPOSED LOCAL LAW AMENDING SECTION 12-8 OF THE VILLAGE CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF TUCKAHOE, ENTITLED "DEFINITIONS" WITHIN CHAPTER 12 ENTITLED, "HOUSING"

At a regular meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Tuckahoe, New York (the "Village") held at Village Hall, 65 Main Street, Tuckahoe, New York on August 10, 2009.

WHEREAS, legislation has been requested amending the definition of " Dwelling Unit" as the same is set forth in Section 12-8 of the Village Code of the Village of Tuckahoe, entitled "Definitions" within Chapter 12 entitled, "Housing" and

WHEREAS, notice of said public hearing was duly advertised in the Journal News, the official newspaper of said Village, on the 22nd day of July 2009; and

WHEREAS, said public hearing was duly held on the 10th day of August 2009, at 8:00 p.m. at Village Hall, 65 Main Street, Tuckahoe, New York, and all parties in attendance were permitted an opportunity to speak on behalf of or in opposition to said proposed Local Law, or any part thereof; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board, after due deliberation, finds it in the best interest of said Village to adopt said Local Law.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it enacted by the Village Board of the Village of Tuckahoe, as follows:

Section 1. The definition of " Dwelling Unit" as the same is set forth in Section 12-8, entitled "Definitions" of the Village Code of the Village of Tuckahoe, is hereby amended as follows:

§ 12-8. Definitions.

Dwelling unit means one (1) or more rooms with living, cooking, sanitary and sleeping facilities therein, arranged with one (1) family [with whom may reside not more than four lodgers or boarders].

Section 2. Insofar as the provisions of this Local Law are inconsistent with the provisions of any other local law, the provisions of this Local Law shall be controlling.

Section 3. This Local Law shall take effect immediately.

Section 4. The Village Clerk be and she hereby is directed to enter this Local Law in the minutes of this meeting and give due notice of the adoption of said Local Law to the Secretary of the State of New York.

Trustee Ecklund motioned to open public hearing was seconded by Trustee Gorman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

Building Inspector Bill Williams said that about 100 boarders live in Tuckahoe. Boarders have to be the functional equivalent of a family. A boarder must share kitchen and bath with the owner and owner must provide off street parking.

Trustee Ecklund motioned to close public hearing was seconded by Trustee Gorman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

PUBLIC HEARING III.

On a proposed Local Law to amend, supplement and/or omit in its entirety Section 4-1.1.4 of the Village Zoning Ordinance which permits the keeping of not more than two boarders or lodgers by a resident family or person, as an accessory use.

Trustee Coleman motioned to continue public hearing was seconded by Trustee Marcoccia and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

Trustee Ecklund motioned to close public hearing was seconded by Trustee Marcoccia and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

PUBLIC HEARING IV.

On a proposed Local Law to amend the code of the Village of Tuckahoe, Section 21-147 entitled "Parking and Storage of Commercial Vehicles, Trailers, Buses"

Trustee Ecklund motioned to open public hearing was seconded by Trustee Gorman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

The Mayor felt that changing the law for one individual does not seem productive. Trustee Gorman favored vans with ladder racks be parked in the driveway instead of on the street.

Trustee Ecklund motioned to close public hearing was seconded by Trustee Gorman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

RESOLUTIONS -

- 1. Mayor Fitzpatrick offered a RESOLUTION** approving the use of certain streets for a Walkathon by the Immaculate Conception School on Friday, October 16th, rain date October 23rd beginning at 10:00 AM. The Walkathon will start at the ICS parking lot then proceed down Winterhill Rd, to Marbledale Rd., to Rogers St, to Circuit Ave and Wallace, stopping at the Assumption Church. The group will then proceed back to ICS following the same route.

Trustee Ecklund made a motion to adopt resolution, seconded by Trustee Coleman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

2. Mayor Fitzpatrick offered a RESOLUTION authorizing the closure of Depot Square from Main St. to Grant Street and Oak Avenue from Main St. to Oak Terrace for the St. Pio Festival as of Thursday, September 24th the day of set up and event is scheduled for Friday, Sept. 25th from 6pm-11pm; Saturday, Sept. 26th from 5pm-11pm and Sunday, Sept. 27th from 1pm-9pm. Further a request is made to utilize the Oak Avenue parking lot on those three days to house the various rides. A request is also made for the procession on Friday, Sept. 25th at 7:30pm leaving the Church of the Assumption proceed Columbus Ave. and ending at Depot Square. A second procession is set for Sunday, Sept. 27th at 8pm leaving Depot Square and ending at the Assumption Church.

Trustee Marcoccia made a motion to adopt resolution, seconded by Trustee Coleman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

3. Mayor Fitzpatrick offered a RESOLUTION approving payment of vouchers in the amount of \$402,451.19 consisting of abstract #11 for \$77,986.83, abstract #12 for \$19,565.41, abstract #13 for \$210,080.62, abstract #14 for \$24,308.72 and abstract #15 for \$70,509.61. The three largest invoices paid were for: (1) September 2009 employee health insurance premium of \$95,078.44, (2) 1st half 2009-2010 Tuckahoe UFSD school taxes of \$18,047.75 and the purchase of 4 solar powered trash receptacles for \$17,640.00.

Trustee Marcoccia made a motion to adopt resolution, seconded by Trustee Coleman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

4. 5. Mayor Fitzpatrick offered a RESOLUTION authorizing the closure of Oakland Avenue between Lincoln and Benedict for a block party on Sunday, Sept. 27th from 1:30pm to 6:30pm. and waiving insurance requirements.

6. Mayor Fitzpatrick offered a RESOLUTION confirming board approval authorizing the Village Clerk to issue a Special Cabaret License to Joe's Quarry Inn for Saturday, September 12, 2009 from 7pm-11pm (Pop music) for Tuckahoe High School fund raising.

Trustee Ecklund made a motion to adopt resolution, seconded by Trustee Coleman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

At a regular meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Tuckahoe, New York (the "Village") held at Village Hall, 65 Main Street, Tuckahoe, New York on September 14, 2009.

WHEREAS, this Board of Trustees wishes to conduct a public hearing relating to an amendment to Local Law No. 1 of 2009 concerning the collection of garbage, trash and refuse.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED

Section 1. That in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law, a public hearing shall be held on or about the 5 day of October 2009, at 8:00 o'clock p.m., at Village Hall, 65 Main Street, Tuckahoe, New York, at which hearing parties in interest and citizens shall have an opportunity to be heard and at which time and place it shall be determined by the said Board of Trustees whether Local Law No. 1 of 2009 concerning the collection of garbage, trash and refuse shall be amended.

Section 2. That the notice of the time and place of such public hearing shall be published by the Village Clerk in the manner provided by applicable law.

Section 3. That this resolution shall take effect immediately.

Trustee Ecklund made a motion to adopt resolution, seconded by Trustee Gorman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

10. Mayor Fitzpatrick offered a RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ADVERTISING FOR PUBLIC BIDS IN CONNECTION WITH THE REFURBISHING AND RECONSTRUCTION OF THE MAIN STREET TENNIS COURT

At a regular meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Tuckahoe, New York (the "Village") held at Village Hall, 65 Main Street, Tuckahoe, New York on September 14, 2009.

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Village to advertise for public bids in connection with the refurbishing and reconstruction of the Main Street tennis court;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED

Section 1. The Village Board hereby authorizes the Village Clerk to advertise for public bids in connection with the project for the refurbishing and reconstruction of the Main Street tennis court.

Section 2. The Village Clerk shall fix the date for the opening of the aforesaid bids, subject to the provision that at all times at least (5) days shall elapse between the first publication advertising this bid and the date so specified for the opening and reading of bids.

Section 3. That this resolution shall take effect immediately.

Trustee Ecklund made a motion to adopt resolution, seconded by Trustee Marcoccia and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

11. Mayor Fitzpatrick offered a RESOLUTION authorizing Chief Costanzo to attend the International Association of Chiefs of Police Conference in Denver, Colorado from October 4th to October 8th.

Trustee Coleman made a motion to adopt resolution, seconded by Trustee Gorman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

12. Mayor Fitzpatrick offered a RESOLUTION authorizing Joseph Lecce P.E. to file for the RP Backflow Device for the new DPW facility on behalf of the Village of Tuckahoe.

Trustee Ecklund made a motion to adopt resolution, seconded by Trustee Gorman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

13. Mayor Fitzpatrick offered a BOND RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF TUCKAHOE, WESTCHESTER COUNTY, NEW YORK (THE "VILLAGE"), AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$649,757.18 IN SERIAL BONDS OF THE VILLAGE TO FINANCE THE PAYMENT OF REAL PROPERTY TAX REFUNDS PAYABLE WITH RESPECT TO CERTAIN PARCELS OF LAND WITHIN THE VILLAGE PURSUANT TO JUDGMENTS IN PROCEEDINGS BROUGHT UNDER ARTICLE SEVEN OF THE REAL PROPERTY TAX LAW

WHEREAS, pursuant to judgments of the New York State Supreme Court, Westchester County (collectively, the "Judgments"), on the following proceedings brought under Article Seven of Real Property Tax Law, the Village of Tuckahoe, Westchester County (the "Village"), is obligated and has agreed to pay refunds for real property tax collected for the 1992-2009 tax assessment years in the aggregate amount of \$649,757.18 (collectively, the "Tax Refunds"):

United States Postal Service, Petitioner against The Assessor of the Village of Tuckahoe, The Board of Review of the Village of Tuckahoe and the Village of Tuckahoe, Respondents, Index Nos. 01-06065, 02-07036, 03-06059, 04-05019, 05-06610, 06-06738, 07-06015 and 08-08194; and

WHEREAS, the payment of the Tax Refunds constitutes a "Type II" action within the meaning of the State Environmental Quality Review Act and the regulations of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation thereunder (collectively, "SEQRA") and therefore no further action under SEQRA with respect thereto need be taken by the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees now wishes to authorize the issuance of the Village's serial bonds and bond anticipation notes to finance the cost of such Tax Refunds in accordance with the Judgments.

NOW THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF TUCKAHOE, WESTCHESTER COUNTY, NEW YORK (THE "VILLAGE") HEREBY RESOLVES (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of all the members of such body), AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The Village is hereby authorized to issue \$649,757.18 principal amount of serial bonds pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law") to pay a portion of the Tax Refunds.

SECTION 2. It is hereby determined that the maximum estimated cost of the aforementioned specific object or purpose is \$649,757.18, said amount is hereby appropriated therefore and the plan for the financing thereof shall consist of the issuance of the \$649,757.18 in serial bonds of the Village authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 1 of this resolution or bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of such serial bonds.

SECTION 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforementioned specific object or purpose is twenty (20) years, pursuant to subdivision a.33-a(c) of Section 11.00 of the Law.

SECTION 4. Current funds are not required to be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds authorized by this resolution or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation thereof, pursuant to Section 107.00(d)(3)(l) of the Law.

SECTION 5. The temporary use of available funds of the Village, not immediately required for the purpose or purposes for which the same were borrowed, raised or otherwise created, is hereby authorized pursuant to Section 165.10 of the Law, for the capital purposes described in Section 1 of this resolution. The Village shall reimburse such expenditures with the proceeds of the bonds or bond anticipation notes authorized by Section 1 of this resolution. This resolution shall constitute a declaration of "official intent" to reimburse the expenditures authorized by Section 1 hereof with the proceeds of the bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized herein, as required by United States Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

SECTION 6. The final maturity of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall be in excess of five (5) years measured from the date of issuance of the first serial bond or bond anticipation note issued pursuant to Section 1 of this resolution.

SECTION 7. Each of the serial bonds authorized by this resolution and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Law and said serial bonds and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the Village, payable as to both principal and interest by a general tax upon all the real property within the Village without legal or constitutional limitation as to rate or amount. The faith and credit of the Village are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal and interest on said serial bonds and bond anticipation notes and provisions shall be made annually in the budget of the Village by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the bonds and bond anticipation notes to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

SECTION 8. Subject to the provisions of this resolution and of the Law, pursuant to the provisions of Section 30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals of said obligations and of Sections 21.00, 50.00, 54.90, 56.00 through 60.00, 62.10 and 63.00 of the Law, the powers and duties of the

Board of Trustees relative to authorizing serial bonds and bond anticipation notes and prescribing terms, form and contents as to the sale and issuance of bonds herein authorized, including without limitation the determination of whether to issue bonds having substantially level or declining debt service and all matters relating thereto, and of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, and the renewals of said bond anticipation notes, are hereby delegated to the Village Treasurer, the chief fiscal officer of the Village. Further, pursuant to subdivision b. of Section 11.00 of the Law, in the event that bonds to be issued for one or more of the objects or purposes authorized by this resolution are combined for sale, pursuant to subdivision c. of Section 57.00 of the Law, with bonds to be issued for one or more objects or purposes authorized by other resolutions of the Board of Trustees, then the power of the Board of Trustees to determine the "weighted average period of probable usefulness" (within the meaning of subdivision a. of Section 11.00 of the Law) for such combined objects or purposes is hereby delegated to the Village Treasurer, as the Chief Financial Officer of the Village.

SECTION 9. The Village Treasurer is hereby further authorized to take such actions and execute such documents as may be necessary to ensure the continued status of the interest on the bonds authorized by this resolution and any notes issued in anticipation thereof, as excludable from gross income for Federal income tax purposes pursuant to Section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and to designate the bonds authorized by this resolution and any notes issued in anticipating thereof, if applicable, as "qualified tax-exempt bonds" in accordance with Section 265(b)(3)(B)(i) of the Code.

SECTION 10. The Village Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to cause a copy of this resolution to be published in full in the official newspaper of the Village, for such purpose, together with a notice of the Village Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Law.

SECTION 11. The validity of the bonds authorized by this resolution and of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds may be contested only if:

(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the Village is not authorized to expend money; or

(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of such resolution are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication; or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the constitution.

Trustee Ecklund made a motion to approve the minutes of the Regular Meeting of August 10, 2009, seconded by Trustee Coleman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

Trustee Ecklund made a motion to approve the minutes of the Special Meeting of August 25, 2009, seconded by Trustee Gorman and upon roll call was carried by a vote 5-0.

IX. REPORTS OF DEPARTMENTS, BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS –

Police Department -

Chief Costanzo reported that only one bid was received from the recently advertised sale of a 1993 Sable and that bid was from a Village employee. Complis, the parking ticket company, will be cross referenced to last year's numbers and by the end of the year we'll know how effective it has been. Further, the ability to enter all issued resident parking stickers in the computer was implemented. Trustee Marcoccia questioned how we know how many tickets are paid. The Chief said they are uploaded in the system. The Mayor added that Complis has a one year contract and if a significant increase is not realized, the contract will not be renewed. Trustee Marcoccia wondered what protection the Village has should the company fold since the money collected goes directly to the service. Treasurer John Pintos said the Village gets paid weekly and the court reconciles.

Treasurer: John Pintos reported that the State auditors, who come about every ten years, recently audited the Village and to mainly ascertain whether the items outlined in the 1998 State audit were corrected. The court was flagged during the audit and their recommendations from their report should be received in three to four months. The recent audit from the Village auditors, Bennet Kielson has been completed.

Public Works: Frank DiMarco announced that bids for the DPW facility are due back on September 30th. The Big Belly Solar trash receptacles are located at Depot Square and Crestwood. The LEED lighting was installed on Ridge Rd. The Sagamore Road project, at Westview, is about finished with two tree planters having been created in that area; the handrail at the corner of Grant Street will be moved and the sidewalk was feathered out to make it more handicapped accessible. A storm drain was added and another raised. This project was accomplished with DPW personnel. Storm water markers will identified and numbered as well as each catch basin will have a number. He encouraged residents to do a better job of recycling; noting that too much recycling material is still mixed with other things. Mayor Fitzpatrick wants OOPS stickers issued. Trustee Coleman suggested recycling brochures be given to the schools and perhaps have the Supt. speak at the schools to educate the students about recycling. It was noted that the State and County inspectors due check and if there is contamination, Village can be cited and the fine is extensive. He thanked Eastchester for the use of GPS.

Building Department: Bill Williams reported that both Planning & Zoning boards are back in session. Mayor Fitzpatrick asked about the number of illegal apartments. Bill Williams said that there are a number of them in the Village and most are being caught through resident parking permits application requests, real estate listings and the Village's relationship with the schools on this matter. The Mayor encouraged residents to report any apartment with construction going on.

Receiver of Taxes. Susan Ciamarra reported that approximately 97% of the first half taxes due in June have been collected...
